GENERAL INFORMATION

To All Stake Presidents:

The Pioneer Day Committee would like to give you an update for your approval of the planned activities for July 21-22, 2006. We appreciate the involvement of your High Council representative and Public Affairs Director in staffing and promoting these events.

Saturday 10:00 AM: Parade, directed by Rick Parker and Mike Duersch. We would like one float from each building in your Stake. The other Wards can participate by assignment with an activity or a food booth. We would like the Stake Presidencies to ride in the parade. You may select your own mode of transportation.

Food and Activity Booths: Tim Stronks will assign specific areas and identify who will do what food so that we do not have duplication.

Fairground and Arena Events, Chuck Wagon Dinner: 11:30-5:30 PM
Bannock County Fairgrounds: Jeff Dean, Janet Tripple and committee members. A multitude of enjoyable and safe activities for all ages will occur during this time: team branding, calf scramble, local posses, mutton busting, greased pig chase, horse rides, wagon rides, and Indian cultural events.

Publicity: Janet Tripple will coordinate newspaper articles - Ruby Francis and Randy Spencer will assist with pioneer stories.

COLORING PARTICIPATION

Grades K-4: Contact your ward public affairs representative to get a coloring page. Complete it at home. Be sure your name, ward and stake are on the lower right hand corner. Turn it in to the public affairs representative by July 20th, 2006. They will be on display all day on July 22nd at the fairgrounds in the same building we used last year to feature information on the Prophet Joseph Smith. If you wish to pick them up after the day's activities, do so by 6 p.m.

DIORAMA PARTICIPATION

Grades 5-8: Build a diorama that portrays some element of "Pioneering the West". There are many ways to be a pioneer. Be creative. Use a box approximately the size of a boot box or a 24 pack soda can box. You may put a backing on it with another box if you wish or leave it flat. Any kind of objects that you wish to use – small doll figurines, trees, handmade wagons, rocks, etc. – are acceptable. Be sure your name, ward and stake are prominently displayed on the right side of the box where it is easily seen. Make arrangements to get your display to your ward public affairs representative by July 20th. You will be responsible to pick up your diorama by 6 p.m. on July 22nd.

ESSAY CONTEST

Grades 9-12: Using the theme "Pioneering the West", write an essay of no more than 300 words. This contest will be judged and the winning essay will be featured in the newspaper. The essay will be judged on creativity (20 pts), addressing the theme (20 points), and acceptable spelling, grammar and sentence construction (10 points). The essay needs to be on one page with your name, ward and stake in the upper right hand corner. Your essays need to be turned in to your ward public affairs representative by July 7th so they can be judged. All essays will be displayed on the 22nd in the building used last year to display information on the Prophet Joseph Smith. They can be picked up by 6 p.m. on the 22nd.

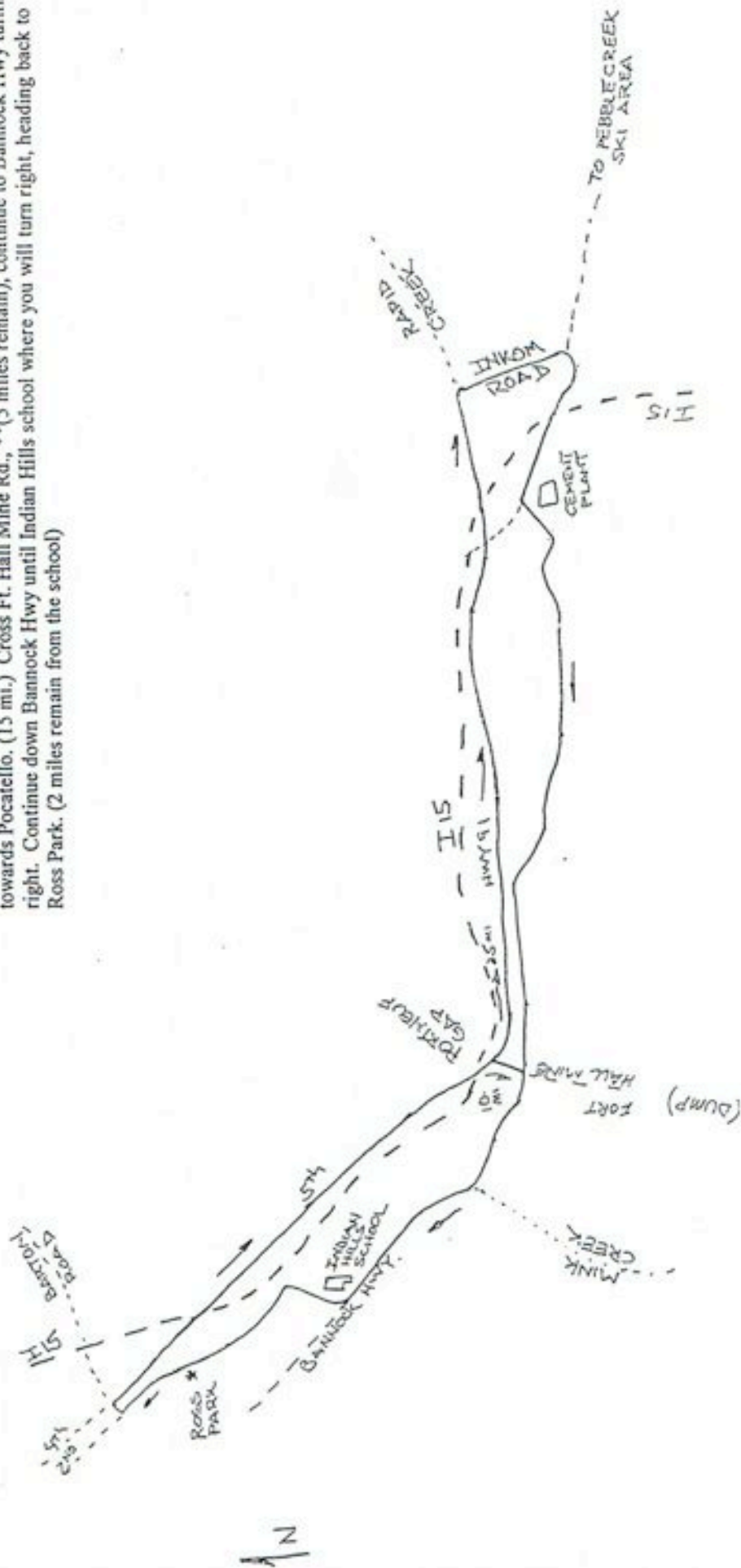

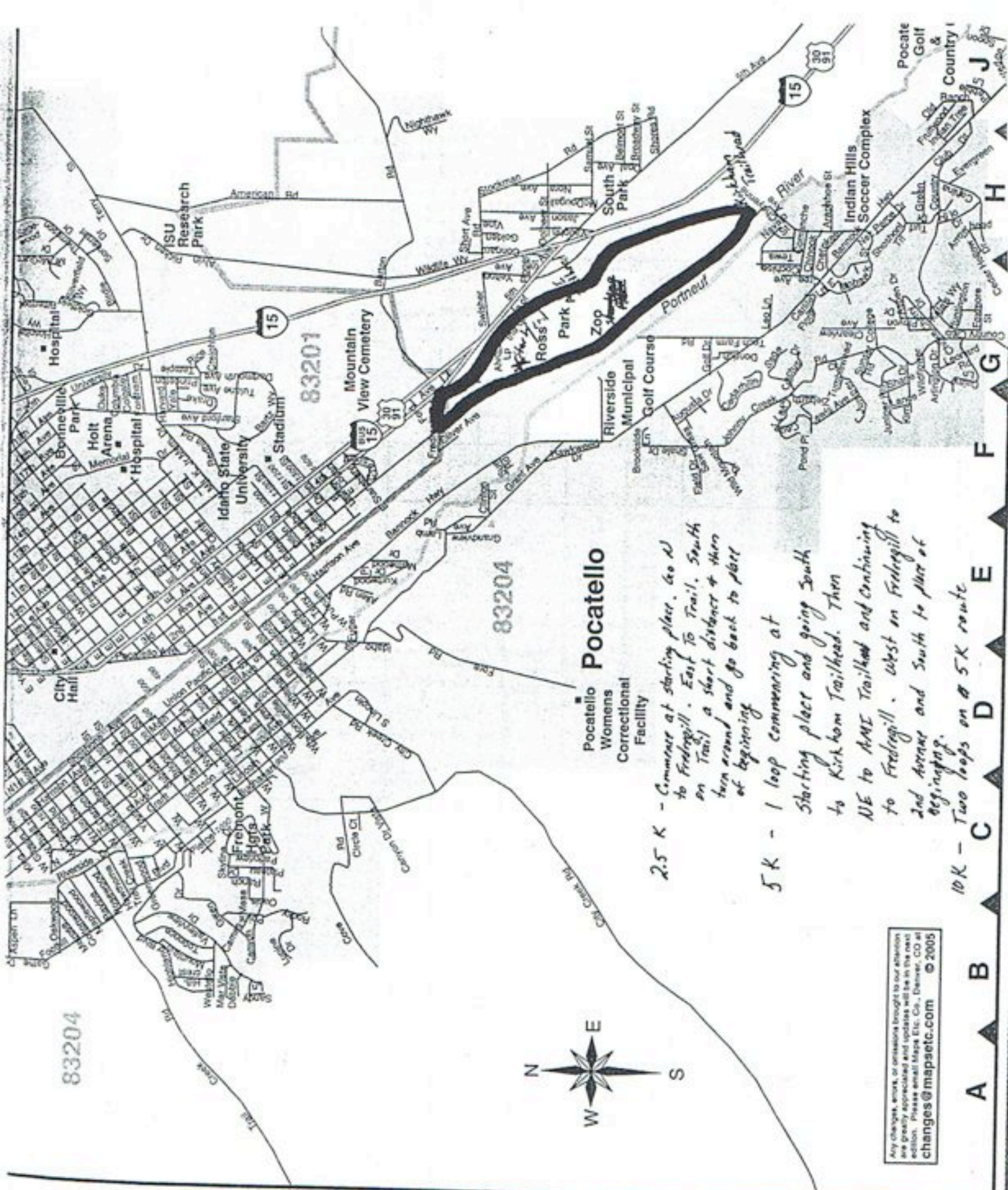

There are 2 courses, 10 mile and 25 mile. Both start and finish at lower Ross Park. They will go from Ross Park, down 4th/5th towards Century High School. Just past the freeway underpass at Fort Hall Mine Road, (4.5 miles from start), the 10 mile course will turn right, cross the railroad tracks and return to Ross park. ** The 25 mile ride will continue on Old Hwy 91 to Inkom. At the road leading from the freeway into Inkom, cross it and continue straight towards the Bible Study Church. (10 mi.) Turn left on Main/Rapid Creek and ride to Jackson Creek where you will turn right. (11 1/2 mi.) Stay right onto Inkom Road, head past the Pebble Creek Ski area then turn off, turning right on Old Hwy 91 back towards Inkom. (13 mi.) In Inkom, turn left on Main Street, at the intersection with the Bank and Sinclair station, towards the cement plant, across the railroad tracks and up the hill. Stay to the right taking West Portneuf Rd back towards Pocatello. (15 mi.) Cross Ft. Hall Mine Rd., ** (5 miles remain), continue to Bannock Hwy turning right. Continue down Bannock Hwy until Indian Hills school where you will turn right, heading back to Ross Park. (2 miles remain from the school)

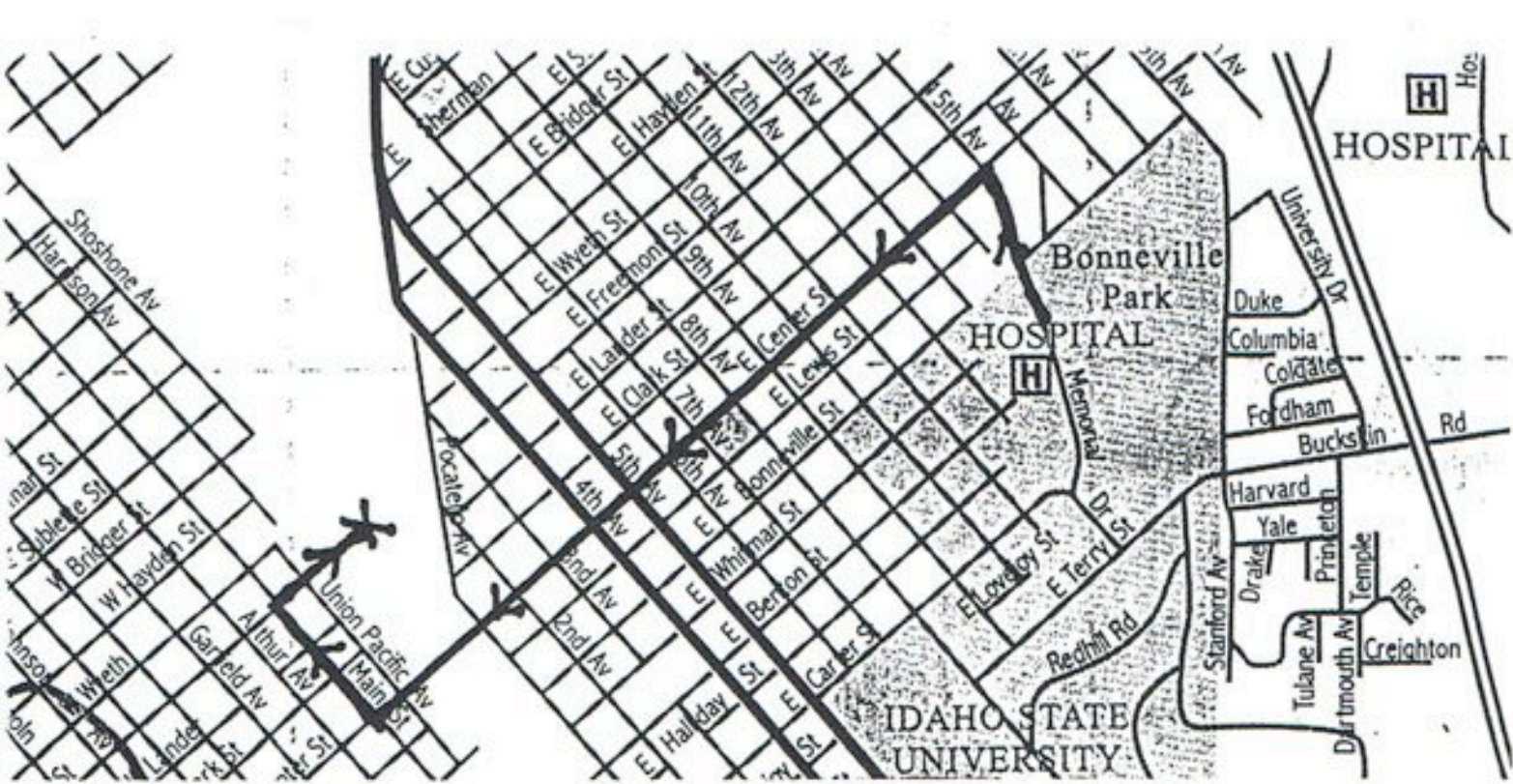

2. The pioneer day committee reserves the right to deny participation to any entry deemed controversial. Only entries with a positive theme and/or message will be accepted. LDS Church standards and ideals are to be maintained.
3. All floats should arrive at Holt Arena parking lot between 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. on July 22nd and **must be ready to be judged by 8:30 a.m.** Marching teams, horses, political, and other entries should arrive prior to 9:00 a.m.
4. Vehicles not intended to pull floats must be kept away from the assembly area except to unload persons or items necessary to complete the float. Please remove the vehicle **PROMPTLY** after unloading.
5. Those arriving with horses and other animals should pay particular attention to potential problems with waste elimination and behavior. **IF YOU HAVE HORSES IN THE PARADE, YOU MUST PROVIDE SOMEONE TO CLEAN UP THE STAGING AREA, PARADE ROUTE, AND UPRR PARKING LOT. THIS IS A CITY ORDINANCE!!**
6. Starting time is 10:00 a.m. All entries should arrive prior to 9:00 a.m. Look for parade officials to help you find your line up position.
7. All parade entries that intend on throwing candy or other objects from the entry must comply with the following:
 - No candy or other objects shall be thrown by children younger than 18 years of age.
 - All candy shall be thrown well clear of the roadway so that no one will be in front of a vehicle to retrieve the candy.
8. Political entries are welcome in the parade, **but no floats are allowed for political entries.** No handbills are to be distributed in the parade. Banners on vehicles are welcome. Passing of candy is also allowed according to the guidelines above.
9. It is important that the parade maintain a steady pace. Performance groups are not allowed to stop and perform lengthy routines which disrupt the flow of the parade.

1. Originality – 20 Points

Freshness, approach, unique or novel ideas, etc.

2. Execution of Theme – 20 Points

Is the float in keeping with the theme? Does the float get its intended message across? Points are deducted if the float is not labeled with the theme. Signs should be easy to read by the spectators.

3. Construction – 15 Points

Overall workmanship. Is the float well constructed and capable of making it through the entire parade route? Is it able to withstand normal wind? Contours and attention to finer details. Use of techniques and materials. Extra effort, not just a truck and trailer.

4. Appearance and General Overall Beauty – 30 Points

Does the float have an appealing or eye catching appearance? Consider interest, impact, beauty, and artistic design. Give special attention to detail.

5. Float Figures (Riders) – 5 Points

Originality, costuming, compliance with theme, and cleanliness. Tasteful incorporation of people, etc.

6. Movable Parts or Special Effects – 5 Points

Something turning, moving up and down, etc.

7. Sound – 5 Points

Does the music or other sounds portray the theme and message of the float? Is it loud enough to be heard and understood? May be live or recorded. May include voice or special sound effects.

Total Possible - 100 Points

Please provide 4 to 6 people to walk the two or three blocks, or area assigned, for the parade route. Garbage bags will be needed. Pick up trash, which may be left along the route. Horse groups are expected to provide for their own dung pickup.

Central Stake – Center St from 7th to 4th

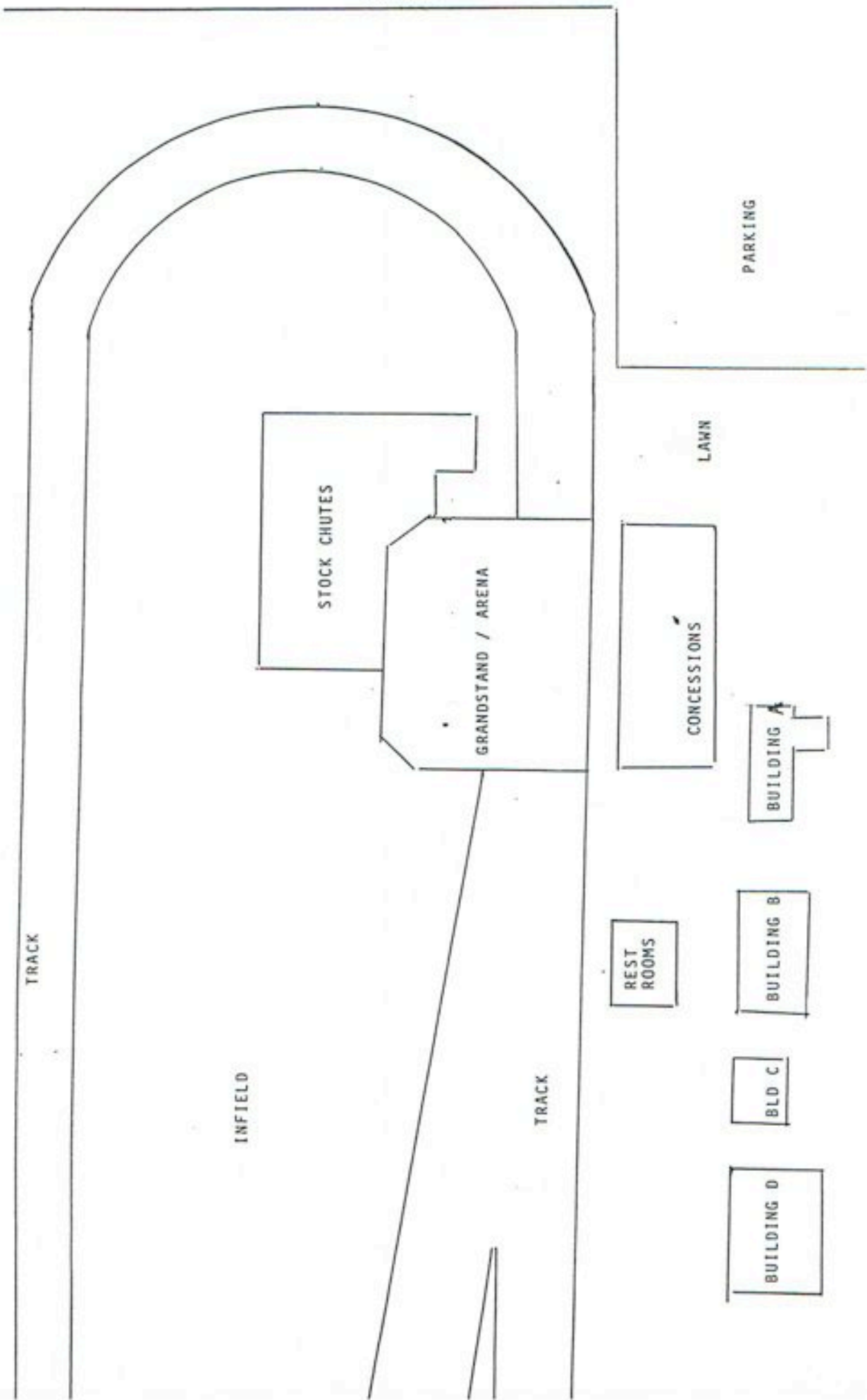

PIONEER DAY FOOD/ACTIVITY BOOTH GUIDELINES

Bannock County Fair Grounds
July 22, 2006

Start Time 11:00 AM.-- Be set up and ready to sell.

1. LDS standards must be observed in products and conduct.
2. No parking of vehicles on the grass except for unloading and loading purposes.
3. Each Ward is responsible for the set up and the clean up of its respective booth
4. Forms must be returned by July 1, 2006. Electricity will be available to all who require it.
5. Electricity is limited in the park and if you doesn't have to have it please don't request it.. Those booths requiring electricity will be responsible for their own feed lines to the outlets. **EACH BOOTH WITH ELECTRICITY MUST PROVIDE A POWER STRIP WITH A BUILT-IN CIRCUIT BREAKER,** (Such as the ones used on home computers, etc.). This will eliminate the burning out of equipment and the possibility of personal injury. Remember no power strip, no electricity!
6. You may set up after 6:00 PM on Friday or on Saturday morning. The Pioneer Day Committee is not responsible for the booths that are set up Friday evening and left over night.
7. Fire extinguishers and first-aid kits are to be in each booth that is cooking.
8. Set your prices to cover your expenses and make a small profit. Turn your money into the committee and they will pay your booth expenses as outlined.
9. These assignments may involve some minor expenditures and time commitments to the Wards, however, if you involve many hands and minds in the work, many creative ideas can come in using the materials you have on hand. Don't overburden anyone.
10. Remember this is a Celebration of our Pioneer Heritage: Let's make this a good time, not just for members of the Church, but also for all the people in Pocatello.
11. A check-in booth for all participating in the park activities will be located in the south fair ground entrance. A posting for assignment of spaces will be there.
12. Each booth is required to assist in cleaning up the area at the end of the day. This is around 5 pm or 5 pm and goes very quickly if everyone helps.
13. Sizes of booths are about 20 ft deep and 12 ft wide. You must stay within your booth area with any tie downs etc.
